


Lots of rowing sessions happening and some lovely spins up to Lough Corrib and around one of the islands.

CAPER BEAG RESTORATION

Caper Beag is a new club project. Galway Hooker Brewery, based in Oranmore, bought an 1887 Bád Iomartha earlier this year. It was originally owned by Tomas O Conaola of Leitir Ard, Caiseal who had Beartaín O Clochartaígh build it and was used for carrying seaweed and gathering scallops.


Over the years it passed through several hands and fell into disrepair, so they approached the club to help. Months of stellar work was undertaken by our GHSC crew, sanding, caulking, painting, and replacing timbers under direction of the Hernons. It's now nearing completion, fast approaching final outfitting and safety checks!

On Monday 3rd October, Caper Beag was relocated from the workshop back into the water, now anchored with the family beside Loveen, Lon Dubh and Anam Cara on Claddagh quay, its timbers swelling to ensure its sealed and seaworthy. This a vital stage and will confirm work was carreid out correctly. Safety first!

The sails needed some customisation to match the spars. These which were trimmed in house, the leaders co-ordinating together on all the tasks to marshal the club who as usual delivered amazing quality work. Caper Beag is already 'Rocking her Red', with sails, riggings, lines, safety kit and final few bits and pieces to be added in coming few weeks. Then she can be launched Hooker style.

THE HAWKS HAVE LANDED

September saw excitement and activity at the boathouse when two Hawk sailboats named Gina-G and Mary-D landed at the pontoon in Dangan. These are Irish Sailing owned and were in town to deliver the Sailing into Wellness program as well as a sail training course for the LGBT community, over a 4 week period in Galway. Tessa Kingston, one of two Irish Sailing instructors that ran both programmes noted that, ".. as far as Sporting Pride and Irish Sailing are concerned Galway was the one that took off the most, with full attendance every session. Many who attended have caught the bug and are now hooked on sailing, so we might get a call from some to join the Hooker club".

Amach Support services have said that this course was their most successful to date as they often put on similar sporting initiatives or courses, but uptake is low. However everyone who signed up for the sailing course engaged with full attendance at each session. Rain or shine on the Corrib, there was full commitment with a lot learnt. The tranquillity of the location session also allowed open chats about mental health, social interactions and fitting in. It was a healthy alternative for people to engage with rather than the usual 'nights out'.

Sailing into Wellness is a charity that offers programs that aim to empower individuals and build a positive sense of community on and off the water. Underpinned by social inclusion and fun, learnings on the water are transferable to everyday life, increasing coping mechanisms and encouraging pro-social behaviour. AMACH! LGBT Galway aims to reflect equally the diversity within the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community by encouraging positive participation from the community. They actively advocate to achieve a solid and safe support structure for the LGBT+ community in Galway. They aim to provide awareness, education, training events and workshops, and endeavour to support and promote a socially inclusive society. While the Hawks were in town, the club took the opportunity to run some of our own initiatives, namely:

European Week of Sport - With support of Irish Sailing and Sports Ireland the club ran a 'Try Sailing' event for some of our GM rower friends, who have been helping to introduce and encourage our own club members into their world of rowing on the Corrib. There was great feedback on this session with rowers enjoying their first ever time on the sail, navigating the river with much less physical exertion and also noting how great it is to see sailboats on the water, being such a joy to row alongside them.

Port of Galway Sea Scout Sailing – Some of our club members are also scout leaders with the Port of Galway Sea Scouts so they hosted a weekend of sailing on the hawks, with over 60 children (ranging in age from 6 to 16) getting time on the water. This was a fun event and always rewarding when you see how much fun the kids have. Thank you to all involved in making this event happen.

Sailing Instructor Programme – again with the support of Irish Sailing and the availability of the Hawks, the club was able to start enrolling crew onto the IS Sailing Instructor course which is aimed at giving and developing the skills needed to teach and deliver sail training courses in our club, e.g. Taste of Sailing, Start Sailing. Over 20 crew expressed an interest in doing this course, and with the weather closing in, the first 8 were quickly chosen to start their course pre-entry assessment day. The course requires a pre-entry practical and theory assessment initially and successful candidates go on to the next stage, the 5 day course where you develop skills to become an IS certified Sail Instructor or Assistant Instructor. The club will continue to roll out this opportunity to those that are interested so that by sailing season 2023 the club will have instructors available to run many sailing courses on our Hookers.
